

Volunteer Spotlight!



"Every year 100,000 people take the on-line Jeopardy test. I have taken it every year for 10 years. Based on their test results, 2500 of those test takers are granted auditions for the show. The rest never hear anything, not a word on how they may

have done on the test. For 9 years I never heard anything after taking the test. Last year, however, after learning that Mary had worked on many game shows in the 70's, including some with Alex Trebek, I mentioned to her that I had wanted to be on Jeopardy for as long as I can remember. Unbeknownst to me, Mary contacted some old friends, worked some of her magic, and the next thing I knew, I got an email from Jeopardy asking me to come in for an audition.

The audition in Los Angeles consisted of another test, an interview and a mock game. When it was over, they told me I passed and was now in the pool of 300 people from whom they choose the 100 contestants they need for a year's worth of shows. About a month later I got "the call" telling me that I had been scheduled to appear on the show. Because Palm Springs is close to LA, I was considered 'local' which gave me an advantage over other people in the pool of 300. For each day of taping they bring in an extra local person in case one of the other contestants can't make it to LA that day.

When Jeopardy is taped, they shoot 5 episodes (a week's worth) in one day. I was told in advance that I was slotted to be on Friday's show or the last episode to be shot that day. Nevertheless I had to be at the Sony studio with all the other contestants at 7:30AM. Mark and I went into LA the night before, stayed in a hotel and I treated him to a delicious French bistro dinner of "all you can eat" mussels.

Once we were all at the studio we were given the 3 hour briefing on all of the rules and legalities of being a contestant. (This was during the hack of Sony by North Korea which made things even more interesting). Then one-by-one we went into make-up. For the entire day as we taped each episode, we were sequestered together. Our cell phones had to be turned off and we were not allowed to speak to anyone outside of the other contestants or Jeopardy staff. We weren't even allowed to go to the bathroom without a staff escort.

When it was my turn to play, we drew lots to see who would be at which podium. I ended up at position 3. The game itself goes so fast, it's over before you know it. It was only when I watched it on TV that I had a complete memory of what happened. Even though I ended up losing, my Jeopardy experience is something I will always treasure. The staff there are very professional and VERY good at what they do. Even though it is the job that they do, day in and day out, they realize that for the contestants it's a big special day and they went out of their way keep it special for us.

After the taping when I told my sister that my dream of being on Jeopardy had come true, she offered a different point of view. She insisted that rather than a dream come true, it was an ambition that I had achieved. Whichever it was I know that I will always be grateful to Mary because even though I earned my spot on the show, I might never had even had the chance to try had it not been for her effort on my behalf."
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Look What Our Volunteers Have Accomplished

One of the Medicare Hospice Conditions of Participation for a hospice to have a volunteer program, is to have the total volunteer hours be 5% of the hospice's total paid staff hours. We ended the 2014 year with 7.88%, easily making the requirement, and then some! Family Hospice Care volunteers saw approximately 1/3 of all admitted patients, from January through December 2014.

this commitment, an annual Service of Remembrance Program is held for families and friends of loved ones who have passed away. This year's Service of Remembrance was held on March 26, 2015, at the Mizell Senior Center in Palm Springs, and was attended by over 135 people.



Rev. Dr. Michael Norrie, DPC, Bereavement Coordinator with FHC, began the program by welcoming all in attendance. "We're here today to remember some special people who, though 'gone from our sight,' are still very much in our hearts. And it is those relationships with the very people we love...'a love that time won't change the meaning of'... that we remember and celebrate today." Dr. Norrie went on to offer more heartfelt and inspirational insights, throughout the program.



The reading of names, honoring the deceased, were read by FHC colleagues. The lights were dimmed in the room, and attendees were asked to light their tea candles, as their loved one's name was read. One-by-one candles were lit until the room was aglow with the memories of those who are no longer with us; everyone in the room connected with love, with understanding, and with gratitude that they shared their loved one's life for a time.

A beautifully flowing video was created by FHC colleagues and set to music, with photos in memory of loved ones departed. Another FHC colleague shared her beautiful voice with everyone by singing "Evergreen (Love Theme from A Star is Born)" and "I Will Always Love You." Both the video and the songs that were sung, evoked tearful and joyful memories, of everyone's beloved.

As the program came to a close, Dr. Norrie invited participants, "....to extend their hands in the direction of the stones (placed on the front table), to infuse them with their love, blessings, good thoughts, and their intention that the stones they select will be a tangible reminder of their loved one that they may carry with them always."

Everyone was encouraged to stay after the program and enjoy desserts, coffee, and tea. This was also a time where families reconnected with the FHC Interdisciplinary Teams that cared for their loved ones, sharing reflections, and exchanging warm hugs.

Several in the audience shared how moved they were at hearing their loved one's name read and seeing their image on the screen. One attendee spoke of how good it was to "reconnect" with the RN Case Manager from whom he said he "learned so much" about providing care to his loved one at the end-of-life.
